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Introduction

Every two years, the federal Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) produces industry and occupation forecasts for a period ten years into the future and the states are asked to do the same for their respective economies. This publication presents Delaware's efforts for the period 2018 to 2028. It supersedes the last such set of projections, which were generated for the 2016-2026 period and were published in July 2018.

Delaware is projected to have 24,990 more jobs in 2028 than in 2018, for an average annual growth rate of 0.5 percent. **Health Care and Social Assistance**, already the state's largest employer by a wide margin, is again expected to show the most growth, accounting for one-half of the total new jobs projected.

Job openings occur when the number of jobs at employers within the state are increasing (growth), or when workers currently in those jobs either find work in another field (transfers) or exit the labor force altogether (exits). Transfers and exits are also called separations. Total job openings are the summation of openings due to growth plus openings due to separations. COVID-19

Delaware's long-term projections were completed during the COVID-19 pandemic. The long-term impact of the pandemic is unknown at the time of writing this report and is not incorporated into the projections. The long-term projections are intended to capture changes to the structure of the economy, and it is too early to determine how the pandemic will impact those structural changes.






In this section, we present job projections and associated data for 439 specific occupations in Delaware, listed by major occupational group. The data elements provided for each occupation are: the Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) code, an estimate of the total number of filled jobs in the state in 2018, the projection of total filled jobs in 2028, the skill category, wage category, job availability, and usual education, work experience, and training requirements. In the following section we present these same occupations arranged by the 16 career clusters used by state educators. There you will find the forecasted annual growth rate, annual openings due to growth, annual exits, annual transfers, and total annual openings, as well as the 2018 estimated average annual wage for each occupation.

Estimates of past employment levels and projections of future employment levels do not refer to the demand

for workers, nor to the supply of workers. They refer to the equilibrium point where the supply and demand for labor are equal, that is, filled jobs. Labor demand and labor supply each have many possible employment levels, depending on the wage level. The wage level adjusts until the supply and demand for any given occupation are the same - that point is the employment estimate or projection for that occupation. Any forecast a decade into the future that predicts shortages or surpluses ignores this fact and is not well grounded in economic theory.

For ease of comparison, this first section presents occupational wages by wage categories. To create the categories, we divided the 439 occupations into quintiles. There are 88 occupations in each category except for *High*, which has 87 occupations. These categories are based on the 2018 average annual wage for each occupation. Of course, it should be recognized that some people working

in each occupation were paid less than the average, and some were paid more than the average, and that those just entering an occupation should expect to be paid less than this amount. More detailed wage distributions for most of these occupations, including estimates for entry- and experienced level wages, can be obtained by contacting our office.

The lowest paying 88 occupations (Low) paid below \$33,400 per year. The next lowest-paying 88 occupations, those in the Below Average category (-Avg), had average wages between \$33,401 and \$43,100 per year. The middle category, Average (Avg) paid from \$43,101 to \$57,800. The second highest-paying category, Above Average (+Avg), had average wages from \$57,801 to \$78,500, while the 87 highest-paying occupations (High) had average annual wages exceeding \$78,500.



The placement of occupations into job availability categories is based on the expected total annual openings. There are four categories of job availability: *Poor*, with fewer than 10 annual total openings projected; *Fair*, with from 10 to 39 annual total openings projected; *Good*, with from 40 to 99 such openings; and *Excellent* (Excl), with 100 or more total annual openings projected. There are 113 occupations with *Excellent* job availability, another 103 in the *Good* category, 136 with *Fair* job availability prospects, and 87 in the *Poor* category.

The rest of the data refer to education, experience, and training requirements. There are seven levels of education, which are intended to describe the typical education level of someone entering the occupation. The education categories range from no formal educational credential (NFE), high school diploma or equivalent (HS), postsecondary vocational training (VocEd), associate's degree (Assoc), bachelor's degree (Bach), and master's degree (Mast), through doctoral or professional degree (PhD/prof). Some occupations typically require experience working in a related field. The work experience measure captures this as one of three possible values: none, less than five years (<5), and five years or more (5+). The on-the-job training field has six possible measures for the typical amount of training required to be considered competent in the occupation. These range from none, short-term on-the-job training of one month or less (SOJT), moderate-term on-the-job training of from one month to one year (MOJT), long-term on-the-job training of over one year (LOJT), and apprenticeship (App), through internship or residency (Int). The skill category places each occupation into the high skill (H), middle skill (M), or low skill (L) category based on a combination of education, work experience, training, and formal certification. We worked closely with the Delaware Department of Education's Career and Technical Education office to develop the categories, which are illustrated in the table on the next page.

Wages by Level of Education, 2018



Occupation Projections by Career Cluster

This section contains occupations grouped by career clusters. The US Department of Education developed these 16 groupings as a way to link school and work, helping students to choose a curriculum which is best suited to their career plans. The occupations listed here are the same ones displayed in the previous section; they are simply organized differently and present some different information.

Occupations are arranged alphabetically within each of the 16 career clusters. For each occupation, we provide its SOC code, forecasted average annual growth rate from 2018 to 2028, average annual openings due to growth for that period, average annual exits (workers leaving an occupation and the labor force), average annual transfers (workers leaving an occupation and transferring to a different occupation), annual total openings, and the estimated 2018 average annual wage. The SOC code can be used to refer back to the previous section to find the usual education, experience, and training requirements for the occupations.

The *Hospitality & Tourism* cluster is expected to generate the most job openings, with 114,452 projected. The *Health Science* cluster has the most new jobs projected, with 8,209. The clusters with the fewest job openings projected are *Arts, Audio/Video Technology & Communications*, with 2,255; *Government & Public Administration*, with 4,171; and *Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics (STEM)*, with 4,629. This last one may be surprising, but it is due to *Information Technology* which is usually considered part of STEM, having its own cluster.

While job openings may be relatively scarce, *Science*, *Technology*, *Engineering* & *Mathematics* (*STEM*) is again the highest-paying cluster; its occupations paid an average wage of \$101,636 in 2018. *Information Technology* was the next highest, at \$91,905. *Hospitality and Tourism* again had the lowest average wage. This cluster's occupations paid an average wage of \$26,744 in 2018. The cluster with the second lowest average pay is *Agriculture*, *Food* & *Natural Resources*, at \$35,243.

Industry Projections

Delaware is projected to add 24,990 new jobs over the 2018-2028 projection period. The average annual job growth for Delaware during the ten-year projection period is expected to be 0.5 percent per year. This is less than the rate that the US Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) is projecting for the nation at 0.6 percent per year. Delaware Goods Producing industries are projected to add 1,470 jobs, while the majority of new jobs are expected in the Service Providing sector with 22,390. Self Employed and Unpaid Family Workers are expected to add 1,130 new jobs.

Agriculture, Forestry, Fishing and Hunting is expected to lose 150 jobs over the next ten years, while Mining is projected to lose 30 jobs. Mining is projected to be the fastest shrinking sector in percent terms, however, this a very small industry sector. Together, these two industry sectors make up the Natural Resources and Mining supersector.

The **Construction** supersector is expected to add 1,680 jobs over the decade with an average annual growth rate of 0.7 percent. This supersector is projected to have the third most in terms of net new jobs. The projected job growth is being driven by job increases in the *Specialty Trade Contractors* and *Construction of Buildings* subsectors.



The *Manufacturing* supersector is estimated to have little change over the projection period decreasing by only 30 jobs. *Computer and Electronic Product Manufacturing* and *Beverage and Tobacco Product Manufacturing* are estimated to see the largest gains in Manufacturing, while the biggest losses are estimated to come from *Food Manufacturing* and *Plastics and Rubber Products Manufacturing*.

The Trade, Transportation, and Utilities supersector is comprised of **Wholesale Trade**, **Retail Trade**, **Transportation and Warehousing** and **Utilities**. Wholesale Trade is estimated to lose 60 jobs over the 2018-2028 projection period. Retail Trade is estimated to gain 60 jobs over the projection period. **Retail Trade** jobs are projected to increase in such areas as Food and Beverage Stores, and Electronics and Appliance Stores and projected to be largely offset by losses in such areas as General Merchandise Stores and Sporting Goods, Hobby, Book, and Music Stores. **Transportation and Warehousing** is expected to gain 960 net jobs over the projection period, an annual average increase of 0.6 percent. These gains are driven by Warehousing and Storage and Support Activities for Transportation. **Utilities** is estimated to decline by 60 jobs over the projection period.

Information is estimated to lose 360 jobs over the decade and with an annual average decline of 0.9 percent it is projected to be the second fastest shrinking industry sector. It is predicted that Information will continue its long-run decline that started in 2001.

The Financial Activities supersector is comprised of the *Finance and Insurance* and the *Real Estate and Rental and Leasing* sector. *Finance and Insurance* is projected to add 1,250 jobs over the ten-year projection period. Most jobs in this sector will be created in *Credit Intermediation and Related Activities*. In the *Real Estate and Rental and Leasing* sector, there are estimated to be 290 new jobs created.

In the Professional & Business Services supersector, Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services is expected to gain 420 jobs. Management of Companies and Enterprises is expected to increase by 320 jobs, and Administrative and Support and Waste Management and Remediation Services is expected to add 340 jobs over the projection period.

The Education and Health Services supersector is comprised of *Educational Services* and *Health Care and Social Assistance*. *Educational Services* is expected to gain 370 jobs during the projected period. *Health Care and Social Assistance*, Delaware's largest industry in term of employment, is projected to add the most jobs over the ten-year period. The 12,640 net new jobs will represent one-half of all projected jobs to be created. Growing at an annual average rate of 1.6 percent per year, it is also projected to be the fastest growing sector in Delaware.

In the Leisure and Hospitality supersector, *Arts, Entertainment, and Recreation* is projected to add 1,160 jobs over the decade and to be the second fastest growing sector with an annual average growth rate of 1.1 percent. *Accommodation and Food Services* is second in terms of projected job gains with 3,440 new jobs over the decade; and with a projected annual average growth rate of 0.8 percent, the third fastest growing industry sector in terms of percent growth.

Other Services, Except Public Administration is expected to add 920 jobs over the projection period with an average annual growth rate of 0.5 percent. Projected job gains in **Other Services, Except Public Administration** is being driven mainly by Personal and Laundry Services.

Government is estimated to add 700 jobs over the 10-year projection period. State Government, Excluding Education and Hospitals is expected to add 400 new jobs, while Local government, Excluding Education and Hospitals is to add 520 new jobs. Federal Government, Excluding Postal Service is projected to lose 220 jobs.

Projected Annual Rate of Growth by Industry Sector, 2018–2028


